It's been a while since I had a chance to provide an update on Buckingham Park so the return of Park News gives me an opportunity to catch up. First of all, I would like to thank all our residents and community groups who helped out friends and neighbours during the lockdowns. I am pleased that our community centre has been back to normal running for several months and we will back to hosting our Christmas Carols event. The Parish started its new four-year term following elections in May. I am pleased that Al Looker, Andrew Beukes and Prakash Dey have continued and serve our community and we have now been joined by a new member of the Council, Poonam Gupta. We are all local residents who serve on the Council because we want help make our community a good place to live. Starting a new term always provides fresh impetus and we have exciting plans that we are working to bring to life.

We also continue to engage developers and Buckinghamshire Council to try and get a resolution to the adoption of our roads and pavements. You may have noticed contractors working on Prince Rupert Drive (installing a raised table and mending kerbs and damage to the road surface) during October. This, along with the resurfacing of the roundabout at the top of Colonel Grantham Avenue, is work that will allow the first of our roads (Colonel Grantham Avenue, and most of Prince Rupert Drive to be adopted by Buckinghamshire Council next year).



The next stage will be completing work on the South East side roads (known as 'phase 1') though it's unlikely to be until much later in 2022.

While we are awaiting adoption we continue to monitor and chase developers to fix broken street lights. So, it's a busy time for the Council. We currently have vacancies on the Parish Council and we are looking for residents who would like to help make a difference and have an input to what happens in Buckingham Park. If you want to have a voice and say in what we do please apply to join us. Just email our Clerk keith.gray6@ btopenworld.com with your details and we will be happy to discuss what the role entails. We will be ensuring our grit bins are full and available for the arrival of winter. I'm looking forward to a busy and productive 2022 but, for now, I will wish you and your families a Happy Christmas and I hope we all get to spend time with loved ones this year.

Who owns Jubilee Square?

The Parish Council remain in constant dialogue with the Management Company for Jubilee Square about the build-up of rubbish in the bins and lack of general maintenance. It is an unfortunate historical legacy from the early days of Buckingham Park that Jubilee Square was sold by developers to private investors so is not under the control of Parish Council.

A new outside gym facility

We are in the process of applying for a funding grant from Buckinghamshire Council's Local Area Board and, if successful, look forward to having the gym equipment installed in the park behind the community centre during Spring.

New land Possibilities

Consideration is being given to how we can best use the area currently occupied by the GP surgery when they move to their new premises next year. We have a couple of options available to us but are open to ideas from local residents.

Parish Council Updates

Parish Playgrounds Refurbishment

The Parish Council have been discussing the possible refurbishment of the playgrounds and considering any improvements that can be made. Some maintenance works will take place and we are looking to add some additional swings.

20mph Road Limits in Buckingham Park

The parish council have supported a proposal from Buckinghamshire Councillor, Peter Cooper for possible changes to some of the road limits in communities like Buckingham Park. Many inner roads in estates like Buckingham Park need to be 20mph and Buckinghamshire Council will now consider this proposal and start to discuss with parish councils what speed limit changes on roads they may like to see changed.

Additional Trees on Buckingham Park

The Parish Council has agreed to plant additional trees on Buckingham Park and we have agreed the replacing of some trees in the main park and we will also be planting a number of fruit trees so residents can use the fruit.

If you have a problem with a footpath/ pavement, you need to register the problem with Buckinghamshire Council Fix-my-Street reporting system - 01296 382416 or www.fixmystreet.buckscc.gov.uk

If your problem is with a Public Footpath crossing a farmers or other landowner land or a Bridleway, then please contact Buckinghamshire Council Rights of Way Team.

They prefer you to use their website

for reporting problems.

This includes: broken stiles, overgrown vegetation or fallen trees, damaged or dangerous path surfaces, damaged or dangerous bridges, damaged or missing signposts and waymarks. Landowners are required to keep rights of way open and useable; this includes providing and maintaining stiles and gates and making sure they are safe and easy to use.

Community Centre Update



What could I possibly say to sum up the trials and tribulations of the last 18 months? The community centre like every business, charity and family has had to adapt to a new way of operating through Covid-19. At the start of the pandemic, I was asked to continue with my regular shifts at the centre Monday - Friday while the other staff members were placed on furlough, looking back it's hard to remember what I filled my time with, but I do remember how nice it was when residents would stop and have a chat through the window with me whilst on their essential trips to the shops. Through this period, it became clear that we would be losing a fair amount of our old hirers with the bulk of these being the small community groups that brought so much life to the centre. It was such a relief to get messages from groups like the sew and so's, Kandeez Dance and ZKS Martial Arts saying they were ready to return as soon as it was safe to do so. Through that summer and the subsequent lockdowns, we've continued to adapt and I can say I couldn't be happier with how all the staff have reacted coming back to work to serve the local community.

This Spring/Summer has been the biggest return to normality we've had, running at almost full capacity during the week and welcoming back private hire on the weekends, it's been great to see the old classes swamped with new faces as well as welcoming brand-new hirers to the centre such as Rhymes stay and play, Deepa's Indian dance class, Melvy's football class and Woofer and Pup Dog Training.

Looking forward now and its tough to see what's next for Buckingham Park Community Centre, we have our festive decorations up and look forward to hosting more events going forward including the upcoming carol event on the 15th along with the annual summer carnival provisionally pencilled in for the 11th of June 2022. However, I think it's clear we shouldn't try and second guess what will be possible next year.

I hope everyone stays safe over the winter and I look forward to seeing you around in the new year.

Active Communities

The residents of Buckingham Park are about to become part of Buckinghamshire Council's pioneering new Active Communities campaign aimed to get everyone just a little more active.

The pandemic has shown us the importance of thinking more regularly about our health. Most people believe that fitness is a good thing and wish they were fitter. The problem is that few are inspired to exercise regularly because they do not have the time, the capability or the enthusiasm.

Exercise usually comes in the shape of sport or some intense physical activity. But science now recognises that being active doesn't have to be a trip the gym. Reducing the length of time we are inactive can also have major health benefits. Simply sitting less, standing often and moving more can make a huge difference. For example, the risk of diabetes, heart disease, high cholesterol levels and even some cancers can be reduced by reducing the amount of time we spend sitting down.

Covid 19 also taught us one other thing - the power of working together to support our physical and emotional health. Active Communities means exactly what it says. It offers the entire community the chance to be more active whilst engaging all residents to encourage each other to add movement into their daily lives as part of their regular behaviour.



Active Communities has already come to Buckingham Park with the Buckingham Park C of E school participating in a programme that adds less sitting and more moving to children's school and nursery life. The children are motivating their parents, too! Buckingham Park Lodge has introduced the Active Communities initiative to motivate their elderly quests to be more active along with their friends and family. The Community Centre is supporting the programme as are all retailers in Jubilee Court. Each is carrying the special 'We support Active Communities' or 'An Active Community school' sticker. And there are further planned further recruitments plus the planning of a unique walk in Buckingham Park.

As we slowly return to normality after the damage of the past couple of years, we need to think carefully about what the "new normal" means to all of us. Health cannot be taken for granted. We should look to protect ourselves every day in any way we can.

The Active Communities programme in Buckingham Park is the perfect place to start.

Welcome Back Smiles

Back in March 2020 Smiles Aylesbury had to stop all of our leisure activities due to the Coronavirus. This caused anxiety and worry for people we support with learning disabilities.

After a brief reunion in the summer of 2020 training was put on hold again however August 2021 saw us back and better than ever. We were able to re start the football training at Buckingham Park Community Centre and It was great to see many of the Players returning. Discussions took place on how everyone had coped throughout the pandemic, with some members using the downtime to spread the word to their friends and neighbours resulting in new players wanting to join not just the football but some of the other activities we offer.

Our football team are now sponsored by Virgin Media and the team play in the Hertfordshire FA leagues where we are once again able to play competitive games. In October we won silverware for the first time since lockdown with the team receiving excellent feedback from the chairman of the Hertfordshire football association who said, 'Your team is a fine example to all'.

Smiles football runs every Wednesday between 5 - 7pm costing £5 per session. If you are interested, please come along, and ask for Paul Freeborn our football coach.

Smiles Pool and Darts restarted at the end of September and meet at the Weavers Public House in Aylesbury.

It was nice to see the players returning to



socialise, wanting to have a game of pool or darts over a pint or two. Smiles Pool and Darts meet every other Thursday between 6 - 8pm. The cost is £3, and includes a small buffet which we thank the Weavers management for providing for us. If you are interested, please come along, and ask for Mick Dorr or any of the staff at the Weavers.





Meet the Team behind Daytop

Daytop Multicultural Centre is a multi-cultural, minority ethnic group, based in Aylesbury, Buckinghamshire. "Daytop" as it is fondly called, channels its energy and resources to help add positive value to the community through brilliant community integration, cohesion and commitment, enabling equal opportunities for all regardless of sex, race, ethnic origin, disability, religion or beliefs.

Daytop was founded by one of its directors - Dayo Olowosale, an enthusiastic Community champion with great passion and diverse experience in Service Delivery and Continual Service Improvement. Through thick and thin over the past 18 months, especially during the Covid-19 pandemic, Daytop has been able to successfully collect 154,610 meals equivalent from local stores and re-distribute across the community helping the vulnerable to stay at home while reducing the contact and spread of Covid-19. This has also helped different local stores immensely to meet their own food wastage targets along with working



towards the Net zero project. In addition to this, Daytop provided free hot-meals for vulnerable individuals.

Aside the Food Re-distribution, Daytop is currently delivering an "Empowering Women with Fashion Design Skills Project" both online and face to face at Buckingham Park Community Centre. This provides fashion design and sewing skills to females between the ages of 24-60 and the over 60s mostly from the black minority ethnic descent who are not in Employment or Education within Aylesbury surroundings. This has proven to be very impactful helping to overcome barriers to learning, employment and increase their chances of becoming financially stable or economically active by being self-employed or getting a paid job. Included in this project is confidence building and personal development to assist the participants to get back into employment. It has been a disruptive and chaotic time with stops and starts along the way but Nina's Escape to Art Classes have since started to expand again when life starting to get back to a normal situation. Nina looks forward to next year, when she will also include new, Wednesday Portrait classes in addition to her Monday morning and evening art classes. 
